LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT



AWFC acknowledges that we operate on the ancestral and traditional territories of many diverse First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities across Canada. We recognize that as a non-Indigenous-led organization addressing inequities rooted in colonialism, our ability to work on these lands are a result of policies that have, historically and currently, harmed Indigenous Peoples.

In our work, we attempt to honour the intrinsic connections that First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities and people have to their land and all living beings therein, especially the profound respect for animals, which is a shared value with AWFC. While Indigenous Peoples are not a monolith, the commonality of a worldview rooted in connection, reciprocity,

and respect for all non-human animals, align with our vision that all animals be well cared for and treated with respect.

We acknowledge the historical and ongoing impacts of colonialism on First Nations, Métis, and Inuit, including the disruption to their traditional ways of life as it relates to ecological balance. We are committed to ongoing learning and relationship building with Indigenous organizations, communities, and people to better inform our work supporting animal welfare organizations and professionals.

We recognize that reconciliation is a process rather than an act, and our work in this area continues.

In 2025, the Animal Welfare Foundation of Canada (AWFC) proudly celebrates 60 years of advancing animal welfare across the country. Since 2008, we've supported over 100 individuals and organizations with more than \$500,000 in funding.

This year alone, thanks to your generous support, we funded nine impactful projects—from marine mammal conservation to farmed animal education—and provided awards to dedicated professionals and students working to improve animal lives in Canada.

As interest in our grants grows—rising from 17 applications in 2020 to 75 in 2024—we've taken important steps to build our capacity. We welcomed two new staff members to help strengthen our operations and fundraising, and launched a new mailing

system and newsletter to keep our community better informed and engaged. We were also thrilled to welcome 81 new donors to the AWFC family.

WISE

Poke-me-Not: Generating Population Data on Large Whale Species Using Non-Invasive Environmental DNA (eDNA) Techniques

Amount Funded: \$10,000 The project aims to

- Develop non-invasive eDNA tools to monitor blue, fin, and sei whale populations.
- Improve animal welfare by replacing invasive biopsy methods with stress-free sampling.
- Contribute to global conservation through data sharing and promotion of humane research practices.

Three Minutes To Change The World

Amount Funded: \$10,000 The project aims to

- Create animated educational videos on farmed and wild animal welfare for children aged 9–12.
- Develop age-appropriate learning tools to teach empathy and ethical thinking around animal use.
- Partner with Quebec Ministry of Education to reach students through curriculum-based distribution.





Wildlife Medicine: Building Capacity to Advance Animal Welfare Practices

Amount Funded: \$10,000 The project aims to

- Provide urgent medical care to sick, injured, and orphaned wildlife across Canada.
- Expand veterinary training through internships, webinars, and a mobile wildlife hospital.
- Treat 200 wild animals and educate 175+ veterinarians to support biodiversity and reduce human-wildlife conflict.

Veterinary Access and Community Outreach Program - Youth Education & Engagement

Amount Funded: \$7,500 The project aims to:

- Deliver culturally relevant animal health education to grade 5-6 students in remote Northern communities.
- Promote responsible pet ownership and rabies awareness through hands-on learning and veterinary engagement.
- Reach 11 underserved communities, inspiring youth interest in animal health and building local welfare advocates.











Marine Mammal SOS: Community Education on Responding to Distressed Marine Wildlife

Amount Funded: \$7,000 The project aims to:

- Educate the public on safe, compassionate responses to distressed marine mammals in coastal B.C.
- Share digital resources, outreach events, and an educational video to promote awareness and proper reporting.
- Build a network of informed community members to support rescue efforts and improve marine mammal welfare.

Animal Welfare Education

Amount Funded: \$5,600 The project aims to:

- Educate youth in Nunavut on responsible pet ownership and animal care.
- Host a week-long vet clinic in Igaluit with hands-on learning led by veterinary professionals.
- Provide schools with educational materials to support long-term awareness and community well-being.





Behind the Labels: Consumer Strategies for Identifying and Responding to Greenwashing and Humane-Washing in Canada

Amount Funded: \$5,000 The project aims to:

- Expose misleading claims in animal agriculture through a False Advertising Report and Action Toolkit.
- Empower consumers with webinars and resources to recognize and challenge greenwashing and humane-washing.
- Promote transparency and accountability to support higher animal welfare and environmental standards.

Barriers to Access to Veterinary Care in Post-Pandemic Canada

Amount Funded: \$5,000 This project aims to:

- Provide national data on barriers to veterinary care in Canada, comparing post-pandemic challenges with 2022 data.
- Identify key barriers like financial constraints, location, and clinic availability to inform policy decisions.
- Influence decision-makers in government, regulatory bodies, and the veterinary industry to shape future strategies for improving care access.





Furry Friends Responsible Dog Ownership Program

Amount Funded: \$3,900 This project aims to:

- Educate children (ages 10-13) on responsible dog ownership, fostering empathy and accountability for animal well-being.
- Teach important topics like dog body language, obedience training, and spay/neuter awareness.
- Promote empathy and accountability to reduce neglect, abandonment and encourage responsible pet ownership in the community.

The AWFC offers small grants to animal welfare clubs at Canadian postsecondary institutions to support educational activities that promote animal welfare and engage students and the broader public for maximum impact.



THE DIANNE MINSHALL UBC MEMORIAL AWARD

The Diane Minshall UBC Memorial Award honours Diane Minshall's legacy in ethical laboratory animal care. It provides funding for UBC and affiliated individuals to attend conferences on research animal welfare, reflecting Diane's lasting impact as a compassionate leader and mentor in the field.



Maya Bodnar 2024 DMMA Awardee

As a PhD student in UBC's Animal Welfare Program, Maya Bodnar is dedicated to improving the welfare of laboratory rodents, with a focus on refining routine procedures such as handling and euthanasia. Her recent work involved enhancing the "drop" method for isoflurane induction in mice, contributing to more humane anesthesia and euthanasia practices. With support from this award, Maya traveled to Bern, Switzerland, to present her research at the 2024 FSVO/UFAW Humanely Ending the Life of Animals Symposium. This opportunity not only allowed her to share her findings but also to connect with global experts committed to advancing humane euthanasia methods.

THE DR CAROL MORGAN MEMORIAL AWARD

The Dr. Carol Morgan Memorial Award honours the legacy of a passionate advocate for animal welfare and ethical veterinary practice. Established by the Animal Welfare Foundation of Canada (AWFC), the award supports continuing education and training in ethics and animal welfare for Canadian veterinarians committed to advancing these values within the profession. Open to practicing veterinarians in good standing, the award may be granted to multiple recipients each year and must not be used for mandated ethics courses. Dr. Morgan's legacy lives on through this award, reflecting her unwavering dedication to justice, compassion, and the ethical treatment of animals.

Dr. Maral Rahmani of PoultryMed Veterinary Services, is an independent veterinarian specializing in poultry in BC, with a strong passion for improving poultry welfare. After earning a master's and PhD degrees in poultry medicine, she then became a diplomate with American Collage of Poultry Veterinarians (ACPV). She is committed to promoting animal welfare through evidence-based practices and compassionate care. She will use this award to attend the 2025 ACPV workshop in April on Current Perspectives on Poultry Welfare, and then leverage this information to educate and support farmers in advancing humane practice in the industry.

A bit of history

In 1965, Mr. T. I. Hughes, then General Manager of the Ontario Humane Society, proposed the creation of an independent foundation dedicated to supporting animal welfare across Canada. With encouragement from respected benefactor Mr. P. R. U. Stratton, Hughes gathered key figures in the movement to form an Organizing Committee.

The Animal Welfare Foundation of Canada (AWFC) was officially incorporated on November 3, 1965, and the first meeting of its Trustees took place on April 23, 1966, in Toronto.

CAPACITY BUILDING

Over the past five years, the Animal Welfare Foundation of Canada (AWFC) has experienced a significant increase in grant applications, rising from 25 in 2019 to 77 in 2024.


